# Complementary Pathways and Family Reunification

#### WHAT ARE COMPLEMENTARY PATHWAYS?

Complementary pathways are the systems that refugees can use to access work, study and other opportunities outside their countries of origin or asylum. They let refugees apply for work, study and other types of visas or reunite with family just like any other person wishing to migrate, but they take into account a refugee's need for protection against forced return, or refoulement. They also offer the opportunity to find protection and/or solutions via named sponsorship and humanitarian admission.

#### WHAT ARE THE TYPES OF COMPLEMENTARY PATHWAYS?

- FAMILY REUNIFICATION: Family reunification procedures are legal, rights-based and states-provided avenues allowing refugees to access this right and reunite with their family members.
- ➤ <u>EDUCATION PATHWAYS</u>: Education pathways are opportunities such as university scholarships or vocational trainings for refugee students to study in a new country. The expansion of such opportunities is one of the pillars of UNHCR's Tertiary Education Strategy (15by30) which aims at 15% of refugee youth enrolled in higher education by 2030.
- LABOUR MOBILITY: Through labour mobility programmes, refugees can move to another country to work and apply their skills.
- PRIVATE/NAMED SPONSORSHIP PATHWAYS: Through private sponsorship programmes, individuals, groups of individuals or organizations nominate specific refugees to enter and stay in their country.
- ➤ <u>HUMANITARIAN PATHWAYS:</u> Programmes designed to offer safety to individuals in need of protection through their identification and transfer to a third country. They can take the form of humanitarian admission programmes or humanitarian visas.

# HOW ARE COMPLEMENTARY PATHWAYS RELEVANT TO UNHCR'S PROTECTION ACTIVITIES?

Complementary pathways are fully embedded in UNHCR sectoral strategies, guidance and other materials at global level, including the <u>Global Compact on Refugees</u>, the <u>Third Country Solutions for Refugees - Roadmap 2030</u> and <u>UNHCR Strategic Directions 2022-2026</u>.

Roadmap 2030 sets the goal for **2.1 million refugees** to benefit from complementary pathways and family reunification by 2030.

# WHO ARE THE MAIN ACTORS IN COMPLEMENTARY PATHWAYS?

Complementary pathways are led by partners; depending on the pathway, these can include State authorities, the corporate sector, universities, faith-based organisations, non-governmental organisations and civil societies, local communities, other UN agencies, refugee and diaspora groups, public sector services, donor organisations, philanthropists, and private entities.

Family reunification is based on the human right of family unity and family life. Although the processes with other pathways are similar, we do not refer to family reunification as a complementary pathway, but as a protection tool, such as asylum and resettlement.

# WHAT IS UNHCR'S ROLE?

UNHCR's overarching role in complementary pathways is to mobilise support, act as a bridge between partners, and broaden horizons around solutions for displaced persons. We advocate for lifting legal, administrative and political obstacles in host and receiving countries to unlock opportunities. UNHCR builds partnerships and networks, supports coordination efforts, and helps to build a stronger evidence base.
